









2022 was a rewarding year for the agency but it also had the challenges that we have encountered since the start of the pandemic. Fundraising has been increasingly difficult with a finite amount of funds available, lower than past years, with many more agencies and needs vying for these limited funds.

One of our major fundraising events planned for 2022 (Rock the Rink) did not materialize but, due to the ongoing efforts of our entire team, the year was a success in non-monetary ways.

The agency faced a reduction in revenues overall but with the return of the Big Night Out to an in-person event, we raised over \$99K in net funds for the agency with that one event.

Overall, due to our fundraising efforts and careful management in 2022, our balance sheet remains strong moving into 2023. Our total assets at year-end were \$486K with net current assets of \$206K.

I believe that the agency remains in a solid financial position as we continue to move forward into 2023 and beyond to provide important services to our community.

Many young people in our region face adversities in their lives, resulting in toxic stress that can negatively impact their development. With the support of a mentor, they can overcome these adversities and develop the confidence needed to reach their full potential.

What are ACEs?

(Adverse Childhood Experiences)

ACEs are potentially traumatic events that can occur between the ages of 0-17 (CDC, 2019). Without supportive adults, they can lead to toxic stress in a child's body. The more ACES a child experiences, the more likely the child is to suffer from things like heart disease and diabetes, poor academic achievement, and substance abuse later in life (Centre for Developing Disease, Harvard).

- Neglect
- Caregiver Mental Illness
- Household Violence
- Bullying

We connected 12 families to the Adopt-A-Family program via the Children's Foundation of Guelph and Wellington.

15 families were provided a full holiday meal kit in December via BBBSCW.

Matches thrived without COVID-19 restrictions.

Intake of youth into BBBSCW programs was a steady flow throughout the year.

Group Program Highlights:

Little Bit of Fun (our waitlist program) and Power of 3 (program for matches) groups showed a consistent increase in attendance throughout the year.

Some of the highlights offered to our groups include: a Guelph Storm hockey game; an Artist-led oil pastel workshop; various holiday themed activities and a well-attended Holiday Party in December.


